**Woodhouse Community Farm,**  
Nr Lichfield, Staffordshire

An historic farm in South Staffordshire has thrown open its gates to schools and colleges in the region after a ground-breaking deal to save it from being sold off. Woodhouse Community Farm at Whittington near Lichfield was left in trust to the neighbouring city of Birmingham in 1936. Two years ago the city decided to auction it off.

But a Community group Woodhouse Community Farm Ltd has now negotiated a long term lease under which it will become responsible for its

day-to-day management and long term restoration.

Many of the features of the 23 acre farm were designed by "Capability Brown" including an orangery and a 3.7 acre walled garden. That has since been returned to full production and the farm has been restocked with cattle, pigs and chicken. The group has also drawn up ambitious plans for a custom built "Food Studies Centre" where visitors will be able to get involved from the fork to the fork.

"We are keen to develop links with all schools and colleges in the area, particularly since many have lost their own gardens and farms. We also want to encourage young people not only to grow their own fresh food but also to help them learn how to cook it" said Chairman Rob Golding.

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Farming And Countryside Education

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Everyday foods are mostly taken for granted. But food is not just something that we eat but is part of our culture through its history, mythology, allure, obsessions, perils and taboos.

Take the humble onion as an example. Where did onions first come from? How did they get to be grown in Britain? Are Spring onions available all year round? What makes us so like (or dislike) their taste? How many ways are they used in cooking? Why do different cultures value different varieties? Why do some cultures have prejudices against the eating of onions? Why were onions used in folk medicine?

What better way to stimulate enquiring minds and encourage interest than to use a questioning approach about food as the starting point for activities? You would be surprised at the number of questions that are generated by children about the most obvious objects. Given the opportunity, children will discover the wonder and excitement of everyday foods and hopefully begin to value those who grow it.

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## FACE Cookery seminar

New kitchen, dining and classroom facilities at Bore Place Organic Farm provided a fabulous location for the recent **FACE** cookery seminar. Farmers and teachers enjoyed rolling up their sleeves to create tasty, seasonal, savoury dishes under the careful guidance of Bore Place staff. Farmers and teachers were also lucky enough to master the art of pastry making whilst producing mini-apple pies with in-

school cookery experts and **FACE** members Cookies Kitchen.

With the majority of ingredients being supplied by the educational gardens at **Bore Place**, farmers and teachers not only picked up lots of practical tips for cooking with school groups, but also ideas and inspiration as to how to incorporate

cookery sessions into their existing programmes of activity.



## Carrots to Cookies

**FACE** was pleased to be working with **Cosford Museum** near Wolverhampton and Telford again this year. The 'Carrots to Cookies' event has run for the last few years.

Over a week around 400 primary school children from as far as Birmingham and Stoke visited the site for a WWII evacuee experience.

Children were involved in a number of activities including making cookies. At the garden plot 'Adam the Gardener', played by Cosford's Philip Clayton, puts children through their paces 'training' them in correct use of garden tools and planting vegetables for the war effort. 'Farmer Brian' (**FACE** Regional Co-ordinator Brian Hainsworth) gives instruction in animal husbandry and the duties the evacuees will be expected to help with on the farm. Children also received instruction

in growing and harvesting of carrots and potatoes!

## FACE News

### Biodiversity c/o British Farming

Thanks to support from the **Big Lottery Fund**, **FACE** carried out a project working with families from disadvantaged areas in Poole. Participants had new opportunities to develop their life skills through exploring biodiversity on farms. As a result of the project, families learnt how to access the countryside on their own for leisure and to take part in nature related activities.

**FACE** SW Co-ordinator Paul Hillard organised 6 farm visits for a total of 81 children and 41 adults. The farms offered chances to handle seeds, feed lambs, take part in trailer tours and find evidence of wildlife.

The families involved were full of excitement and interest and **FACE** is delighted to have introduced them to some of the joys of the countryside.



### Wildlife on the farm

How many different types of grass can you find within a square metre? Children from **Valley Primary School** on Anglesey found plenty, on a visit to **Gwêl Enlli Farm** in July. They learned how a wide variety of grasses, plants and flowers thrive on the farm, which is farmed organically, and how these provide a varied diet for the Welsh Black cows and a source of food for many insects, including mayflies, dragonflies and butterflies. They also found water voles and frogs, and saw trees which had been planted. Dr Wil Roberts and Dr Diana Roberts, the farmers, led the visit as part of a **Soil Association and Organic Centre Wales** project.



### Visit My Farm

Working in partnership with **LEAF** and **Natural England**, **FACE** has created a programme of support for farmers hosting visits consisting of workshops and a new **Visit My Farm** website [www.visitmyfarm.org](http://www.visitmyfarm.org). The website is a unique, one-stop shop providing a wealth of information, resources and ideas for engaging farm visits, and an easy-to-use

online information hub for farmers who want to get involved.



### FACE team meeting

The venue for this year's **FACE** team summer meeting was the **Institute of Biological, Environmental and Rural Sciences (IBERS)** at **Aberystwyth University**. Staff provided a tour of the facilities, including the Miscanthus (elephant grass) bio fuel trial plots, the high-sugar grass breeding programme and the Grassohol project, where scientists are processing grass to produce a range of products that are normally derived from oil, including fuels, textiles and plastics. Using land for energy crops without harming food production is one of the great challenges of agriculture at present, and scientists at **IBERS** are working on all aspects of food

security and sustainability, from the laboratory to the field.

### Calling primary teachers and careers advisors!

**FACE** is working in partnership with **Harper Adams University College** to deliver an accredited training course throughout the country for primary school teachers about food, farming and the countryside. These courses are being delivered throughout England and Wales and as a result of their success, a further course has been developed for careers teachers and advisers. With the demise of the **Connexions Service**, schools will now be responsible for arranging their own careers provision and this course will help provide teachers with up to date information about the wide range of careers available



throughout the food and farming sector.

### Yorkshire Agricultural Society Countryside Careers

The necessity of attracting young people into the farming industry is one of the **Yorkshire Agricultural Society's** key aims. Says Chief Executive, Nigel Pulling: "It's absolutely vital that at the very least, young people are aware of the wide variety of career opportunities in the rural sector. We need bright young people as tomorrow's industry leaders as well as hands-on farmers."

Two Society supported events have been held recently. Around 1,000 teenagers attended the



fourth **Countryside Careers Day** to talk to staff from a wide

range of businesses, colleges and organisations. Complementing this was a conference to "teach the teachers." Organised by **The Food & Farming Forum**, careers advisers and teachers were told of the importance of attracting top flight students to the sector and the opportunities available. "We need them to signpost students to what's out there so they can make informed decisions," said Nigel.

### Moulton College Facebook project

Following the success of its seasonal family events at **Moulton College's Countryside Education Centre** at



Holdenby, a new **Facebook** group has been created where families can share their

experiences. The aim is to create an online "scrapbook" where people can post pictures and comments and keep in touch with others they meet at the events. There are already many families who visit several times throughout the year and this will give them the opportunity to keep in touch and share pictures and videos. Using **Facebook** also allows the centre to

communicate more effectively with families to keep them up to date with upcoming events and plan last minute events such as snow activity days.

The centre is part of **Moulton College's** aim to introduce the principles of the countryside to very young children and as part of this it is hoped to create a community of families sharing their enjoyment of the countryside through the centre.

### Farming, Environment and Sustainability Challenge results

The Final of the 2011 **Farming, Environment and Sustainability Challenge**, which is run by the **Newbury and District Agricultural Society**, was recently hosted at **Sheepdrove Organic Farm** with a record eight Secondary schools reaching the Final from across the whole of the County. The topics

were wide ranging and each school was linked with a business and worked on a challenge of benefit to both partners.

The winners, Trinity School, had worked with Cobbs Farm Shop to design recipes for the teenage market, using produce from the farm. The runners up were Down's School who had adopted some rescue hens from the **Swindon Animal Rescue Centre**. Following their experience of caring for the hens, they produced leaflets for the Rescue Centre to give to future

customers, offering guidance on caring for the birds. Also in second place were **Theale Green School**. These students had worked with the gamekeeper on the Englefield estate to devise deer proof netting for the plants and trees there.

### Food for Life Partnership drives change

Since 2007, Food for Life Partnership (FFLP) schools across England have been putting the subject of fresh, healthy, sustainable food firmly into the centre of pupils' lives. While the success of the scheme can be demonstrated by over 4,000 schools participating, independent evaluation of its impact is encouraging. Evidence reveals that FFLP school pupils have healthier eating habits. Increased consumption of fruit and vegetables is attributed to farm-based learning and participation in cooking and growing activities. The research also suggests that FFLP can help reduce the health and academic attainment gap between disadvantaged children and their peers. Uptake of free school meals has increased, seen as crucial in encouraging healthy eating. The Partnership has shown that taking a 'big picture' approach by putting food culture at the heart of schools is crucial in driving real change, and the project is proud of its achievements.

Alongside traditional farming demonstrations including sheep shearing, sheepdog handling and poultry keeping, additional elements were included to further help connect food and farming such as cheese and sausage-making demonstrations.

For his research topic John investigated the value of on Farm Education from the perspective of both teachers and farmers. **Rowley Farm** was recently shortlisted in the final of the Bayer Face awards and John hosts many educational visits on the farm, often preceded by a visit in school. As well as giving visiting students an insight into modern farming and farmer's wider

role in the countryside John hopes to inspire young people to consider a career in agriculture or its many allied industries.

John says “you can never be too educated to be a farmer nowadays”. His achievements in lifelong learning are a fitting testament to this.

### Children go back to Tudor days on a Peak District farm



**Peak District National Park** rangers got together with the **Dove Valley Education Centre** to whisk children from **Hartington and Biggin Primary School** back to Tudor times.

A full day's activities were staged, with both the children and leaders dressed in Tudor clothes, re-enacting what daily life would have been like for ordinary people in the times of Henry VIII or Elizabeth I.

Area ranger Lynn Burrow explained: “The children collected vegetables from a Tudor garden and water from a well; they cooked medieval potage and oatcakes over an open fire then had a go at spinning and weaving. They also became an oxen team learning how medieval ridge and furrows were formed, before trying their hand at dead hedging.”

The day included a drama based on historic events at the centuries-old farmhouse near Sheen where the centre is based. The children also explored Tudor documents relating to the land, and wrote their own wills with a quill.

### Helping Schools to Grow Healthy Food

The **South of England Agricultural Society** provided funding to encourage land-based colleges to help local primary schools to start growing healthy food with a special emphasis on using water wisely. Tutors and students from **Plumpton College** helped **Ditchling CE Primary School** and **Plumpton Primary School** pupils to come up with novel ideas to grow herbs and vegetables using recycled materials and as little water as possible. The results of their labours were exhibited at the South of England Show where the theme was 'Water'. South-East Water kindly provided two water butts for the winning school - **Ditchling CE Primary**. The whole school was involved with the project and pupils enjoyed the hands-on learning under expert guidance.

### YFCs to help support agricultural learning in schools

The National Federation of Young Farmers' Clubs (NFYFC) is working with Warwickshire Young Farmers' Clubs and FACE to develop new ways of forging mutually beneficial links between YFCs and schools.

A new workshop is being developed this autumn which will help equip Young Farmers' Clubs members to go into schools and help broaden students' understanding of the agricultural industry, potential careers in the sector and opportunities available through agricultural colleges.

The pilot scheme will work on a peer mentoring model and may be further developed to include farm walks as part of Cardinal Wiseman School's environmental and land-based GCSE course, although it could be expanded to include sixth-form students who might be considering attending agricultural colleges.

The pilot project, which resulted from NFYFC co-sponsoring the first School Farms Network conference in July, will also explore the possibility of creating an in-school YFC at the Coventry school.

### SMILE (Students Motivate Innovative Learning through Enterprise.) 2011

FACE member Lakeside Farm Park is closely involved in the SMILE project. The farm ran a planting workshop and all involved were kept busy in the sunshine at Kenfig Nature reserve.



The theme this year was "the plight of the Bumble Bee" and the winning song by Dolau Primary will be published shortly and will be available to download from iTunes.

The winning design bee from the primary schools was unveiled after being produced by engineering students of Bridgend College.

### Schools at the Newbury Show

Pupils from 62 schools across Berkshire visited the Education tent at the Newbury Show to see

40 displays on the competition theme of "Outside the Classroom". Entries showcased, amongst other subjects, the huge number and variety of allotments now established in school grounds.



## New Resources

### New website for Cornish primary schools

A website for children all about farming in Cornwall and how the food it produces arrives on the plate has been launched by the Cornwall Food and Farming Group. With photos, games, recipes and sound effects, www.cornwallfoodandfarming.net is an informative and fun way for primary school aged children to get a better understanding of agriculture and food production in Cornwall. As well as information on what is happening on the farm and what produce is in season, there is a list of farms to visit, background stories about iconic Cornish foods and a monthly archive of things to look out for.

### Clean Hands Zone Toolkit

FCFCG (Federation of City Farms and Community Gardens) has designed a set of free-to-use, highly accessible, health and safety signs to encourage farm visitors to wash their hands. Better signage was called for by the Griffin Report, following the E.coli outbreak in 2010.
