## Farming and sustainability

The Enabling Effective Support (EES) Forum in Powys held a successful ESGC Rally for pupils and teachers at the Royal Welsh Showground in January. Entitled 'Actions speak Louder...' over 70 pupils from years 6 and 7 from 27 schools attended with teachers. Kirsty Williams AM gave the opening address and at the end of the day each school identified what steps they would take to be more eco-friendly in the years ahead. Caroline Davies, the then CAFE Project Coordinator, ran two workshops during the day tackling local food and seasonality. Follow up work is planned to link the schools with local farms.

Schools in Glamorgan have been taking part in a project to hatch their own eggs, as part of a project funded by NFU Cymru. Charlotte Edwards from Food for Thought, a group of farmers who work with local schools, supplies the eggs from her own chickens on her home farm. She said, "It's a fantastic experience for everyone. It is the only project in school that has the whole school team excited, from pupils to caretaking staff. The pupils keep diaries, draw pictures and learn a lot about animals and farming during the project. Schools hire incubators for 21 days, and they can be connected to a computer."

## Let's Grow

Two events were organised in March to help teachers get gardening, one at Greenmeadow Community Farm in Cwmbrân and the other at Centre for Alternative Land Use at Henfaes near Bangor. Sponsored by Morrisons as part of their Let's Grow project, the events brought together gardening experts and community groups who are able to give teachers a hand with their projects. There was lots of enthusiasm for growing food in schools and we hope to organize more events like this.
